Make Way for Ducklings (and Turtles!)

Have you noticed a difference in our pond? That murky, green water is clear! The pond had suffered from eutrophication – the issue of excess nutrients causing harmful algal blooms and making the resource inhospitable to local wildlife. Using an innovative all-natural intervention, the pond's ecosystem has been restored, welcoming back turtles, ducks, geese, and other birds and critters. What's Blooming in the Garden?



Did you know that up until 2021, the Hempstead House Garden was filled exclusively with thousands of roses? Originally created by Florence Guggenheim in 1924, by 2011, the garden had become a ragged field of grass. That's when Karli Hagedorn and Aldo Calabrese designed a rose garden

that would pay homage to its history while also bringing beauty and elegance to the space. Unfortunately, in 2021, the garden was hit by Rosette's Disease, which decimated the roses. In 2023, a new garden was unveiled. With a

carefully curated selection of dozens of diverse native plant species, the garden is filled with colorful flowers that attract birds, butterflies, and other local pollinators, making it both aesthetically pleasing and ecologically beneficial. It's beautiful all year round, but our first flowers are just starting to bloom - visit
